# Chronicles

**Author**: The authorship is mostly unknown, though there is Jewish tradition that Ezra was the original author.

**Date**: Around 450 BCE after another return from exile to Jerusalem.

Audience: The returning exiles

**Reason**: Largely this book was to bring the Israelites back

into their historic identity following exile.

**Theme**: God's covenant with David's line and those who would be kinds in Judah.

## **Key Verse:**

### 2 Chronicles 7:14 CEB

<sup>14</sup> if my people who belong to me will humbly pray, seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, forgive their sin, and heal their land.

**Sections**: 1 Chronicles: Re-telling of history (Ch 1-10), Building of the Temple complex (11-29)

2 Chronicles: Reign of Solomon (Ch 1-9), History of Judah and the Temple (Ch 10-36)

Key Words: Temple, Law, Covenant, Kingdom

**Basic Intro**: 1 Chronicles is a re-sharing of the messages we had in Kings but it caries a much more positive tone then Kings did. The key difference to see and feel in this work and Kings is that Chronicles follows the religiousness

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of the kings while Kings follows the political.

## **Questions for Discussion:**

- How did Kings bring people into a right relationship with God?
- With all of the genealogies, what does it mean for us to be in that succession of this lineage? Is it important? Is this a new thought for you? Does it give hope or frustration?
- If this book is more positive than Kings, is it helpful for us to sometimes re-tell our history with a positive light? Why? Does it help us move forward or does it lead to further error?
